SUPPORT BAPTIST CHURCH PLANTERS



We rejoice to have a Council that engages and provides wisdom and advocacy from their engagement. They believe in the vision of BCP to help churches be healthy so that they might multiply.

Shared reports brought rejoicing and prayer for the 90 plus churches we are serving or are in the process of onboarding. Out of their collaborative efforts came the approval of Marty Basinger to be a Director of Church Facilitation with focus geographically in NY, OH, PA and the coast. He will bring a prayer emphasis to our team and churches. Council approved a clear pathway of investing the financial resources God has given into ministry pursuits, and they proposed the generous care of a missionary family who had extreme medical costs.

God has graciously provided clarity for the next year, even though we don't fully know what He will do as we walk with Him. Our plans include onboarding, consulting, training, and coaching more churches, while deepening partner relationships. We aim to embrace multiplication, hoping to add more missionaries, begin new church plants or replants, and potentially bring on key team members, such as a director of church facilitation or a VP of Church Relations. Though we can't foresee the outcomes or challenges, we remain committed to faithfulness and endurance, trusting God to determine the fruit.

The Mission family is deeply thankful for each Council member and the incredible time and effort they dedicate to absorbing extensive communication and information. Their partnership with us through prayer, wisdom, church ministry connections, and generous support is invaluable. As we welcome three new Council members, we also bid farewell to three others whose faithful service and care have been a true blessing. Both the remaining Council members and our team expressed heartfelt gratitude for their dedication and lasting impact on our ministry.

We are also grateful for you—partners from long ago and the newest faithful supporters of our growing family. Thank you for your continued interest in the work of this Mission and your part in it as God leads.

Celebrating the Retirement of Jim and Sharon Solomon

Jim and Sharon put down deep roots where God plants them, and their faithfulness to their God-given ministries is an example to us. They have served the Lord for over 50 years each, and their full-time ministry of almost 20 years was invested in just two churches. Full-time ministry began as missionary pastor and wife of Calvary Baptist Tabernacle in Gardena, CA, with Southwest Baptist Home Missions. They served there from 2006 to around 2012 when it was determined for health reasons that relocating to West Virginia was God's next assignment for them.

They joined BCP in 2012 and began their partner raising efforts, only to have God "put on the brakes," as they call it, for 12.5 weeks in mid-2013 when Jim went into the hospital for diverticulitis and spent 6-7 weeks in a coma, nearly passing away seven times, finally coming out of the hospital in October, and hitting the deputation trail again in January of 2014 with a sense of "God is not finished with me yet! There is work to do!"

In May 2014, they were appointed as missionary pastor and wife to a rescue work, Galilean Baptist Church in Fairmont, WV, and by August of 2014, Jim and Sharon had relocated cross-country. They reported that "along the way we had six new tires put on the truck, a little transmission issue, and overheated once. Sounds about right, but in every case, we knew God was in control." They landed in West Virginia and promptly planted themselves into life and ministry with their same characteristic determination.

Following colon resection surgery in November 2014, Jim and Sharon purchased a fixer-upper home (December 2014), and Jim recorded, "We are seeing many parallels between rebuilding the house and rebuilding the church!" But they were praising the Lord at that time over the addition of qualified deacons, the beginning of ladies' ministries and a joyful choir! In 2016 they reported that "attendance has doubled in the last year, five couples and one family with three boys have joined the church, offerings have increased, the mortgage has been paid down and will be paid off this year. We were also able to completely remodel the upstairs room where we have children's church and our church dinners, and we finished paving the parking lot."





2017 marked seven years of ministry there. The church celebrated 50 years of existence. Jim and Sharon wrote, "God has worked in many ways over the years to keep His light going in this area through this body of believers." They also reported that "God has given us a beautiful home, land, an abundance of tall trees and fruit trees that are bearing many peaches this year. Our two children and their spouses love and serve the Lord and have blessed us with five grandsons. We have some health challenges, and the winter and spring were particularly difficult this year, but I (Jim) have been able to stay out of the hospital for two years. PRAISE The Lord!"

Jim and Sharon Solomon just retired from being full-time missionaries. They speak often of their faithful prayer and financial supporters, many of whom have supported them for over two decades. That is predictable as it's a pleasure to partner with God's servants who minister so effectively for so long. There is so much fruit in all of these accounts—Jim and Sharon's as well as their faithful partners.
