When the heart is correctly focused, peace and joy are possible, yes, even best found and fostered, in the midst of difficult, busy, or undesirable circumstances.

Consider the circumstances surrounding Jesus' birth for Mary and Joseph. Messy, chaotic, full of travel and expense, and pretty unpeaceful considering they were running for their lives at one point. Yet we catch glimpses of much joy and that accompanying peace as God revealed His perfect plan for this little family! "Fear not, Mary!" "Fear not, Joseph!" "My heart rejoices in Christ, my Savior," said Mary. "I bring tidings of great joy!" declared the angel. There is peace and joy offered to us because of this day instead of stolen by this day. Let's change our mindset—Christmas is a holy day, not a holiday.

When our heart is focused on commemorating (which is what a holy day was for) the birth of the Son of God, Christmas is experienced as a holy day. All the trimmings of the season then can cause spiritual reflection:



- The lights: Jesus is the Light of the world who shines bright against the dark backdrop of our world!
- The spending on gifts: What a great cost our salvation was to Heaven and to Jesus! How generous of the Father to send us that indescribable Gift!
- The wrapping, giving, and unwrapping of gifts:
 A picture of the sharing of the gospel with thoughtfulness and love. A gift that is to be joyfully received with great thankfulness.



Jesus is our Prince of Peace (Isaiah 9:6) and our exceeding joy (Psalm 43:4). One of the beauties of Christmas is that it offers us peace and joy right in the midst of chaos. We sing "sleep in heavenly peace," for Baby Jesus because we know that He was in the right place at the right time and for us!

The truth we need to remember is that we too can sleep (and celebrate) in the peace He offers this Christmas season—if we'll only choose to.
